INTRODUCTION AND OVERVIEW



- This report presents residents' attitudes towards services provided by the Council, their local area, getting involved, arts and culture, Hertfordshire County Council's website and communications, and public health.
- The Autumn 2016 findings are based on a survey of around 1,000 telephone interviews, carried out between 28th September and 18th November, with around 100 in each of the districts. This report shows results from this wave only.
- The sample was statistically weighted by age, gender, working status, ethnicity and the local authority area of residents to ensure that the proportionate distribution of the survey accurately reflects the distribution of adult residents across the county.
- Differences mentioned within the text of this presentation are statistically significant at the 95% level of confidence.
- Where percentages do not sum to 100, this may be due to rounding, the exclusion of 'don't know' categories, or multiple answers.
- In some cases figures of 2% or below are not shown in the graphs.
- Where possible the colours used in the charts have been standardised with a 'traffic light' system in which: green shades represent positive responses, beige represents neither positive nor negative responses, red shades represent negative responses and the bolder shades are used to highlight responses at the 'extremes' – for example, very satisfied or very dissatisfied.
- National results taken from:
 - LGA/LGinsight National Poll (October 2016), a telephone survey with a representative cross-section of 1,002 GB residents aged 18+. Figures rebased to exclude "Don't know" responses
 - Community Life Survey 2015-16 a face to face survey with randomly selected adults aged 16+ in England. Figures based on cumulative data (3,027 interviews) across 2015-16.










COUNCIL SATISFACTION


Satisfaction with the way Hertfordshire County Council runs things...






- Three quarters (76%) of Hertfordshire residents are satisfied with the way the County Council runs things, with 15% being very satisfied. Only 10% of residents are dissatisfied with the way the Council runs things.
- This compares to 68% nationally being satisfied with the way their local council runs things (LGA/LGinsight National Poll (October 2016).
- Residents living in North Hertfordshire and those aged 16-24 years or 75 years+ are significantly more likely to be satisfied with the way the County Council runs things, while those living in Watford are significantly less likely to be satisfied.

Have services Hertfordshire County Council provide got better, stayed the same or got worse?

- Almost 7 in 10 residents (69%) think that the services Hertfordshire County Council provide have stayed the same, whilst a further 7% say they have got better. However, almost a quarter (24%) of residents state that they have got worse.
- Residents living in Broxbourne and St Albans and residents aged 35-44 years and 65-74 years are significantly more likely to say that the services the County Council provide have got worse while residents aged 16-24 years are significantly more likely to say that the services have got better.



- The most frequently stated services which residents feel have got better are Highways (33%), Transport (20%) and waste disposal (18%).
- However, 57% of those who feel services have got worse in general feel that Highways have got worse, while 40% feel Waste Disposal has got worse.
- Residents living in **Broxbourne** are significantly more likely to feel that <u>Waste Disposal</u> has got worse, while residents living in **St Albans** are significantly more likely to feel <u>Highways</u> have got worse.


Note: Despite clarification of services provided by HCC earlier in the survey, some respondents may be referring to district waste *collection* rather than waste *disposal* so caution so be exercised when using this result.


- Almost three fifths (57%) of Hertfordshire residents feel that Hertfordshire County Council keeps them well informed about the services and benefits it provides, with 9% feeling they are very well informed.
- Residents living in North Hertfordshire and those aged 65+ years are significantly more likely to feel they are kept well informed about the services and benefits Hertfordshire County Council provides, while those living in Three Rivers and those aged 25-34 years are significantly less likely to feel they are kept well informed.

Agreement that Hertfordshire County Council provides value for money...



- Over two fifths (43%) of Hertfordshire residents agree that Hertfordshire County Council (HCC) provides value for money, with 5% strongly agreeing. Just under a fifth (19%) disagree that the Council provides value for money, while almost two fifths (38%) neither agree nor disagree.
- This compares to 49% nationally agreeing that their local Council provides value for money (LGA/LGinsight National Poll (October 2016)).
- Residents aged 65+ years are significantly more likely to agree that HCC provides value for money while residents in Three Rivers are significantly less likely to agree.


Do you know who your local County Councillor is?

- Only 18% of residents claim to know who their local County Councillor is while the majority (82%) do not know this.
- Residents aged 65-74 years and those living in Dacorum are significantly more likely to claim to know who their local County Councillor is while those aged 16-24 years are significantly less likely to claim to know who their local County Councillor is.

Could you tell me their name?




- Of those who said that they knew who their local County Councillor was, three fifths (60%) could not correctly name them. Therefore, of all residents only 6% knew and could correctly name their local County Councillor.
- Those who could not name their County Councillor were prompted with the name of the relevant person and on this occasion 43% had heard of their local County Councillor. When calculated as a proportion of *all residents* 46% have at least *heard* of their local County Councillor.

Have you previously heard of Councillor xxx?






To what extent, if at all, do you trust Hertfordshire County Council?

- Over three quarters (77%) of residents trust Hertfordshire County Council at least to some extent.
- Residents living in Dacorum are significantly more likely to trust Hertfordshire County Council at least to some extent.


To what extent, if at all, do you think Hertfordshire County Council is innovative?

- Over half (53%) of Hertfordshire residents think that Hertfordshire County Council is innovative at least to some extent.
- Residents living in Dacroum and those aged 65 years+ are significantly more likely to think that Hertfordshire County Council is innovative at least to some extent, while residents living in St Albans and those aged 45-54 years are significantly less likely to think that Hertfordshire County Council is innovative.


To what extent, if at all, do you think that Hertfordshire County Council acts on the concerns of residents?


- Over three fifths (64%) of residents believe that Hertfordshire County Council acts on the concerns of residents at least to some extent.
- Residents aged 75 years+ are significantly more likely to think that Hertfordshire County Council acts on the concerns of residents at least to some extent, while those aged 45-54 years are significantly less likely to think this.

Agreement that residents can influence decisions affecting the local area




- Almost a third (32%) of Hertfordshire residents agree that they can influence decisions affecting the local area with 5% strongly agreeing. However, almost half (47%) disagree that they can influence decisions with around a fifth (19%) strongly disagreeing that this is the case.
- This compares to 36% nationally who agree they can influence decisions affecting the local area (Community Life Survey 2015-16).
- There are no significant differences, between districts or age-groups, in the proportion who agree that residents can influence decisions affecting the local area.

Agreement that the Council does enough to look after people in need




- Over two fifths (42%) of residents agree that the Council does enough to look after people most in need, while a quarter (25%) disagree.
- Residents aged 16-24 years are significantly more likely to agree that the Council does enough to look after people who are most in need.



- Around 3 in 10 (31%) of residents agree that the Council helps people into work, while over a fifth of residents disagree (21%).
- Residents aged 16-24 are significantly more likely to agree that the Council helps people into work. Conversely, residents aged 45-64 are significantly less likely to agree.

Agreement that the Council encourages residents to get involved in their local community

- Over two fifths (43%) of residents agree that the Council encourages residents to get involved in their local community, while around a third (34%) disagree.
- Residents aged 75 years+ and those living in Stevenage are significantly more likely to agree that the Council encourages residents to get involved.











LOCAL AREA


- Three quarters (75%) of residents have lived in their local area for 10 years or more, with over half (55%) having lived there for 20 years or more. Only 4% of residents have lived in the area for less than 12 months.
- Residents aged 55 years or over are significantly more likely to have lived in the area for 20 years or more while residents aged 25-34 years are significantly more likely to have lived in the area for less than 5 years.


- Almost 9 in 10 residents (89%) are satisfied with their local area as a place to live with more than half (52%) being very satisfied. Only 8% are dissatisfied with their area as a place to live.
- This compares with 83% nationally who are satisfied with their local area as a place to live (LGA/LGinsight National Poll (October 2016)).
- Residents living in East Hertfordshire are significantly more likely to be satisfied with the area as a place to live. Residents living in Broxbourne are significantly less likely to be satisfied with the area as a place to live.

How strongly do you feel you belong to your local area?



- Around a third (33%) of residents feel they belong very strongly to their local area, whilst a further 45% feel they belong fairly strongly (78% combined). Only 6% feel they belong not at all strongly.
- This compares to 71% nationally who feel they belong very or fairly strongly to their local area (Community Life Survey 2015-16*)
- Residents living in Dacorum or North Hertfordshire and those aged 65-74 years are significantly more likely to feel that they belong very or fairly strongly to their local area, while residents living in Broxbourne are significantly less likely to feel they belong very or fairly strongly to their local area.

* The question in the Community Life surveys asks about 'neighbourhood' as opposed to 'local area'.






• Over three fifths (65%) of all residents would like to be more involved in decisions that affect their local area. However, just over a third (34%) would not like to be more involved and 1% feel that it would depend on the issue.

Yes 65%

- This compares to 39% nationally who would like to be more involved in decisions that affect their local area (Community Life Survey 2014-15*).
- Residents aged 35-44 years are significantly more likely to want to become more involved in decisions that affect their area while residents aged 65+ years are significantly less likely to want to be more involved in decisions that affect their local area.

^{*} Community Life survey prompts a 'Depends on issue' whereas this is only taken as a spontaneous response in the Hertfordshire survey.

Extent of agreement that their local area is a place where people from different ethnic backgrounds get on well together



Base: All residents (993)

- Over four fifths (82%) of residents agree their local area is one in which people from different ethnic backgrounds get on well together – that is living alongside each other with respect. Only 7% disagree with this.
- Residents living in Watford and those aged 16-24 years are significantly more likely to agree that their local area is one in which people from different ethnic backgrounds get on well together, while those aged 65-74 years are significantly less likely to agree.











GETTING INVOLVED

Participation in activities as part of a local or community group, club or organisation in the last 12 months



Base: All residents (1,001)

- Over two fifths of residents (45%) have participated in activities as part of local or community groups, clubs or organisations within the last 12 months, while the remaining 55% have not.
- Residents aged 75+ years and those living in St Albans are significantly more likely to have participated in activities as part of local or community groups, clubs or organisations in the last 12 months, while residents aged 25-34 years and those living in Stevenage and Watford are significantly less likely to have participated in community activities.



- Two fifths (40%) of residents have taken part in voluntary work of some sort in the last 12 months, whilst 60% have not.
- This compares to 41% nationally who participate in formal volunteering (Community Life Survey 2015-16*).
- Residents aged 65-74 years are significantly more likely to have taken part in volunteering in the last 12 months while those aged 25-34 years and those living in Broxbourne and Stevenage are significantly less likely to have taken part in voluntary work in the last 12 months.

* The question in the Community Life surveys asks about 'formal volunteering' whereas this survey asks about 'volunteering' in general.

Frequency of participation in voluntary work

- Of those who have taken part in voluntary work, almost half (48%) participate at least once a week and around 7 in 10 (70%) participate at least once a month.
- Residents aged 65-74 years are significantly more likely to take part in voluntary work at least once a month.










ARTS & CULTURE


Agreement that arts & culture makes a difference to the local area



Base: All residents (982)

- Around two thirds (66%) of all residents agree that arts and culture make a difference to the area where they live while a fifth (20%) neither agree nor disagree and only 14% disagree.
- Residents living in North Hertfordshire or St Albans are significantly more likely to agree that arts and culture makes a difference to the area where they live, while those living in Stevenage and those aged 16-24 years are significantly less likely to agree with this.

Agreement that there are lots of opportunities to get involved in the arts






- Over half (54%) of all residents agree that there are lots of opportunities to get involved in the arts if they want to, while almost a quarter (24%) neither agree nor disagree and over a fifth (22%) disagree.
- Residents living in North Hertfordshire and those aged 65 years + are significantly more likely to agree there are lots of opportunities to get involved in the arts if they want to, while those aged 16-34 years are significantly less likely to agree with this.

Taking part in and going to arts and culture events



- Over two fifths of residents (44%) have either taken part in or gone to an arts and culture event in Hertfordshire in the last 12 months, however over half (56%) have not been to any art and culture events.
- Residents living in St Albans and those aged 45-64 years are significantly more likely have taken part in or gone to an arts and culture event in the last 12 months, while those living in Broxbourne or Stevenage and those aged 16-34 years are significantly less likely to have done so.





- Of those who have taken part in or gone to arts and culture events in the last 12 months, around 7 in 10 (71%) have attended musicals, plays, dance events or musical performances while a quarter (25%) have attended art, photography or craft exhibitions. Almost a fifth (19%) have taken part in organised arts and culture activities, for example music, dance, photography or writing.
- Other events include religious, historical, food and cultural festivals.

- Of those who have taken part in or gone to arts and culture events in the last 12 months, 7 in 10 (70%) have done so at least 3 or 4 times a year, with around a quarter (26%) doing so at least once a month.
- Residents living in St Albans and those aged 65-75 years are significantly more likely to have taken part in or gone to arts and culture events at least 3 or 4 times in the last year.







Frequency of accessing Hertfordshire County Council website in the last six months



- Almost half (48%) of all residents have not accessed the council's website at all in the last six months while a further 39% have only accessed the website a few times, but less than once a month.
- 13% have accessed the council's website at least once a month over the last six months, while 4% have accessed the website at least once a week.
- Residents aged 75+ are significantly more likely not to have visited the Council's website at all.

Information Looked for on Council Website






- The information most frequently looked for on the council website is related to waste disposal/recycling/ environmental health (30%), followed by planning/planning applications (17%), road works (14%) and education (14%).
- **Residents aged 25-34 years are** significantly more likely to be looking for information on council tax, while residents aged 35-44 years are significantly more likely to be looking for information on Education, those aged 65-74 years are significantly more likely to be looking for information on planning/planning applications and those aged 75 years+ are significantly more likely to be looking for information on road work/closures/state of roads.


Thinking about your most recent visit to the HCC website, did you find all the information you were looking for?

• The majority of residents (80%) fully, or mostly, found what they were looking for when they accessed the Council's website. 12% failed to find the information they were looking for, while a further 8% only partly found what they were looking for on the Council's website.

• Three quarters (75%) of residents found their experience of using the council website very or fairly good, the last time they visited. Only 9% found the website poor, with 16% stating it was neither good nor poor.









COMMUNICATIONS





- Just fewer than a third (31%) have recently seen or heard something about the council having increased Council Tax this year to protect its spending on services provided.
- Residents aged 65 -74 years and those living in Broxbourne are significantly more likely to have seen or heard something about the council increasing Council Tax, while those aged 16-24 years or living in Welwyn Hatfield are significantly less likely.
- Of those who have seen or heard something, 12% state that this has made them feel generally <u>more</u> <u>positive</u> towards the council while around a fifth (21%) state this has made them feel <u>more negative</u> towards the council. Two thirds (67%) feel no different.
- Residents aged 75 years + are significantly more likely to state that this has made them feel more positive towards the council while those aged 35-44 years and those living in Broxbourne are significantly more likely to state that this has made them feel more negative towards the council.





- Around a third (34%) have recently seen or heard something about central government reducing the amount of funding it gives to Hertfordshire County Council.
- Residents aged 65 + years and those living in St Albans are significantly more likely to have seen or heard something about central government reducing the amount of funding it gives to Hertfordshire County Council, while those aged 16-34 years are significantly less likely to have heard about the changes.

Hertfordshire's Great School Campaign & Improvements to the County's Ofsted rating



- Just under a fifth (18%) of residents have recently seen or heard something about Hertfordshire's great school campaign and improvement to the county's Ofsted rating.
- Residents living in East Hertfordshire and Hertsmere are significantly less likely to have heard about Hertfordshire's great schools campaign.
- Of those who have seen or heard something, almost three fifths (57%) state that this has made them feel generally <u>more positive</u> towards the council while only 2% state this has made them feel <u>more negative</u> towards the council.
- Residents living in Stevenage are significantly more likely to state that this has made them feel more positive towards the council.



- Around a fifth (19%) of residents have recently seen or heard something about how a campaign to recruit more care workers.
- Of those who have seen or heard something, over half (53%) state that this has made them feel generally <u>more positive</u> towards the council while only 2% state this has made them feel <u>more negative</u> towards the council.




Seen or Heard any Information about Hertfordshire County Council Helping People to Improve their Health

- Of all residents just over a quarter (27%) have seen or heard any information about Hertfordshire County Council helping to improve their health.
- Residents aged 65-74 years and those living in Welwyn Hatfield are significantly more likely to have seen or heard any information about Hertfordshire County Council helping to improve their health while those aged 25-34 years are significantly less likely to have seen or heard any information.


Where did you See or Hear Information about HCC Helping People to Improve their Health?

- Of the residents who had seen or heard information about Hertfordshire county Council helping people to improve their health 35% did so at a doctors/GP survey, 32% through local media (newspaper, radio, TV) and 17% in Horizon magazine (Herts County Council magazine).
- Other places include social media/the internet, schools, hospitals and word of mouth.


What was the Information about?



Base: All residents who had seen or heard information (205)

- Of the residents who saw or heard information about Hertfordshire County Council trying to improve people's health, around three quarters (76%) saw information on 'One You/How Are You?' about healthy lifestyles. 10% saw information on Stoptober (stop smoking month) and 8% saw information on Winter Health.
- Around a fifth (21%) saw information about other campaigns such as Dry January, Alcohol Awareness Week, walking, mental health, giving up smoking generally, and general health.


Did you do anything as a result of the information you saw or heard?

- Of those who had seen or heard information on improving health, over four fifths (83%) said they didn't do anything as a result.
- However, 6% increased their physical activity, 3% shared the information with someone else, 2% made improvements to their diet and 1% quit or tried to quit smoking.
- Residents living in Stevenage are significantly more likely to have increased their physical activity as a result of information they have seen or heard.

How did the Health Information make you Feel about the Council?

- Of all residents who have seen or heard information about Hertfordshire County Council improving people's health over half (54%) stated that this makes them feel more positive towards the council, while only 1% feel more negative. However 45% stated that it makes them feel no different towards the council.
- Residents aged 16-24 years are significantly more likely to say that the information makes them feel more positive towards the council.
