## HOW YOUR VIEWS HELP TO IMPROVE THINGS

When you give your views, we feed them back (anonymously) to Senior Managers so they can make changes to being in care if needed. A recent example is that a young person said care leavers shouldn't have to pay Council Tax. This was listened to and Managers are looking at how to make this happen.

Please help to make changes by taking a few moments to complete our surveys on line. If you visit Hertfordshire's website www.hertfordshire.gov.uk and search CHICC you'll see our surveys there. One is about whether you get opportunities to do interesting and fun things – e.g. like going to museums or the theatre or to see a musical. Nearly 50 of you have already completed this – thank you!

Another survey is about how things are if you live out of county and another survey will soon go on about what it is like if you have been in care for longer than 3 years.

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## RECENT EVENTS AND ACTIVITIES

YOUNG PEOPLE ASK CORPORATE PARENTS FOR MORE SUPPORT

In May, 5 members of CHICC spoke to over 70 elected Members at the full Council meeting in the Council Chambers at County Hall. Members of the Council are the people who are voted for in elections, to run local services. Our young people delivered a powerful presentation on education, training and employment, and the different stages they were all at in life. Members listened to what was said and are looking at all the issues raised to see if anything needs changing. Members will report back to CHICC in September. Our young people did brilliantly, and everyone was proud of them. Below are some of their key messages:

E', who is 15yrs and sitting her GCSE's next year asked Corporate Parents to: 'Make sure stat reviews and PEPs are more discreet because when people come in with badges, other pupils ask questions. Also, as our Corporate Parents please provide more work experience placements for young people in care. Invite us in to work with you!' Also a general message for everyone working with young people in care: 'Let us create our own first impressions. Don't judge us by our files. Be persistent and support us, even if we push you away'

**A',** 16 and taking GCSEs this year said: 'Please help to make sure that all young people in care can achieve their

goals. Make sure we get support as soon as difficulties arise at school or placement. Make sure that things are as stable as possible when we are doing exams and encourage us to remain in education and do our best. Never give up on us.'

K', 18yrs and on a Level 1 apprentice in Health and Social Care said: 'We need to make sure teachers are taking more of an interest in children's lives. I think sometimes teachers think it's not their responsibility to raise concerns about young people's home lives. But if it's not theirs, whose is it? Also, there should be more support for young people when being put into care or transitioning placements for them to access some form of education, even if it's not school e.g. tutors or small groups as soon as possible, because people think that it's too much at that time, when actually you like to have moments of distraction from all the chaos'.

C', 24yrs and in her 2nd year of a
Degree in Law said: 'Things to do with
University should be promoted more with
children and young people in care and
care leavers. We should have
promotional days at universities. I went on
Aim Higher for two days at
Cambridge University and it gave me a
feel for University and how much funding
I'd get etc. It inspired me to think I could
do it – there should be more of that. More
days in Universities doing activities.
I also think it should be easier to access



education after 21yrs. It is so stressful to get your case re-opened and it could put you off. We should encourage young people of every age to go to University – even as a mature student is great. More financial assistance would also help, to cover travel etc. It's harder for care leavers because we don't have our families to fall back on.

It can be hard to get a job, and having a degree really helps improve life chances and gives you loads of experience. It opens up more avenues. Education may not be for everyone but we should encourage as much as possible – who knows where you can end up?'

**E', 23yrs and a Children's Nurse working in Children's Emergency said:** 'My advice to you as Members, carers, social workers, managers, parents etc. is to listen to young people, 5 minutes of your time is more valuable than you realise.
